Reading Luke 10:25-37

The Parable of the Good Samaritan

²⁵ Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ²⁶ He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" ²⁷ He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself." ²⁸ And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

²⁹ But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?" ³⁰ Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³ But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. ³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' ³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" ³⁷ He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

Message Justify

Lord, would you guide us into your truth through these halting words of mine and in the power of the Holy Spirit. May our hearts be fertile soil for the seeds of the Spirit to take root and bear good fruit. Amen.

Yes, but. Have you ever found yourself saying, 'Yes, but'? It's nearly always a precursor to something along the lines of, 'I'm right and you're wrong.' Yes,

but you haven't thought of this. Yes, but my solution is better than yours. Yes, but it can't possibly work that way. The other thing we can reliably get from the words, yes, but, is that in most cases you haven't heard what I actually said. Certainly you likely heard the *words* I said, but you haven't heard what I was attempting to convey. What is really happening is that you are attempting to justify your position rather than receive mine.

This is exactly what we see in the response the lawyer had for Jesus. The lawyer wasn't interested in what Jesus had to say, he was simply interested in finding fault with it in any way he could. Let's pause with that a little and have a look at the context for this story. You could imagine that Jesus is in something like a lecture theatre. He is standing at the front following a lecture and the floor is open to questions. It is a hostile audience and they are looking to trip him up over what he has been saying. That means that every question is designed with a hook in it.

Then a lawyer stands up to test Jesus. Immediately we are on the lookout for what is about to happen. This is not some innocent question from a curious bystander, it comes with the knowledge that the intent in the question is devious. And that means that we need to examine the question to see why it might be a problem.

"Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

On the surface a perfectly reasonable question. But we know that a good lawyer will always know the answer to the question before they ask it. For the Jews the answer was that you needed to follow the Torah with all its rules about behaviour. The Torah itself wasn't the problem. The problem was a labyrinth that had been created over centuries to ensure people didn't break the rules of the Torah. The tiniest details were mapped out over what you could and couldn't do. It still happens today. An example. Lighting a fire is considered work and since you are not allowed to work on the Sabbath, you can't light a fire on the Sabbath. Today that extends to turning lights on or off. Why? Because the act of switching has the potential to create an electrical spark that is defined as fire. So to avoid the possibility you don't turn on lights on the Sabbath. Leaving aside the arguments over the sensibility of this, it is an example of how easily you could be caught out by missing small details. It is likely that this is what the lawyer was angling for. Catch Jesus in a small detail and he could go to town on him.

Unfortunately for the lawyer, Jesus takes an entirely different route. Instead of dealing with the mass of rules and expectations laid down over centuries Jesus replies with a question. "What do you think?" In an instant the interrogation moves 180 degrees. It is no longer the lawyer attempting to catch Jesus out, it is Jesus examining the heart of the lawyer.

The lawyer, not wanting to be caught out by his own trick answers, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself." Immediately we see that the lawyer had come with his own answer prepared as a part of the trap. He knows that there is no way anyone could possibly fulfil all the details built up over centuries and that there was really only one reasonable response. Then Jesus springs a trap of his own. He knows that the lawyer has this answer down pat. He also knows that having an answer and following through on the implications of that answer are two different things. He can see that the lawyer is not actually interested in him or anyone else inheriting eternal life. It's entirely possible, given the various religious stances of the Jewish parties, that he doesn't even believe there is such a thing as eternal life. No, the lawyer is only interested in catching Jesus out on something he says. Which means he is completely unprepared for Jesus' next words, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

It really is rather funny if you care to ponder it for a moment. The lawyer, standing there having expected to put Jesus on the spot finds him put on a rather uncomfortable spot himself. This wasn't supposed to be about him. But now everybody is watching him and waiting for his next response. How can he answer without digging an even deeper hole than he already finds himself in?

So, we come to the famous line, 'But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?"' By now the audience must be on the edge of their seats. Jesus vs. the Lawyer. First the question. Good question, plenty of potential for upset, score: 1-0. Then the reply question. Ah, getting interesting, nice return, score 1-1. The answer. Good answer, right down the party line, score: 2-1. Massive reply, going to be hard to return this one: score 2-2. Weak response, look like he's rolled over here: score 2-3. Game still on, but not looking good for the lawyer. Good story in response, leaves the lawyer with little to work on: score 2-4. Now the lawyer concedes the next point, the story has backed him into a corner: score 2-5. And Jesus doesn't leave it there — 'Go and do likewise.' Home run, that's a six, slam dunk: score 'you're outta here!'

The problem the lawyer faced is that he brought legal arguments to a faith table which is a little like bringing a knife to a gunfight, or a cake-mixer to a flower competition. Entering the kingdom of heaven isn't about whether you follow a list of rules and regulations. It is about faith. We are told in Romans 4 that Abraham trusted God to set him right instead of trying to be right on his own. Hebrews 11 reminds us that without faith it is impossible to please God. In Galatians 2 we read that we are not set right with God by rule-keeping but only through personal faith in Jesus Christ.

The truth the lawyer had lost sight of was he had no way of justifying himself before God if all he brought were rules and regulations. He knew full well that it was impossible to follow all the rules. It's why he asked the question in the first place. His mistake came in missing the fact that not only could Jesus not follow all the rules and regulations, neither could he. And worse, even if he could follow them all, without faith it meant nothing.

I want to leave us on this note. James reminds us that faith without works is dead. When Jesus tells the lawyer to show mercy, he is asking the lawyer to begin from the rule of faith and to measure all his actions by that rule of faith. It doesn't mean he will get everything right in the process. We know Abraham certainly failed in that respect. Yet, through acting in faith, even making mistakes in faith, God responded with love, grace and mercy and justified him through that faith. Just as God does for each of us.

We Pray

God of our faith who sees our hearts and knows that we deserve nothing, yet gives us life. We confess that we often attempt to justify ourselves, to ourselves, to others, to you. We try to attach blame to others, point out failings in others, all to deflect from our own blame and failings. Gift us, we pray, with faith that works itself out in love and mercy toward ourselves and others. Let us learn from the lawyer that it is not about who our neighbour is, but rather how we treat that neighbour. That it is not about them, but about us. That we are measured not by the actions of someone else, but by our own actions. Help us to show mercy to our neighbours, and to ourselves. In Jesus name we pray. Amen.
