Reading 1 John 4:7-21

⁷ Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹ God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰ In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹ Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

¹³ By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵ God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶ So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷ Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸ There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment,

and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹ We love because he first loved us. ²⁰ Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹ The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Message It's Complicated

Imagine you were to meet an alien for the first time. They know nothing about human beings and they ask you what love is all about. How would they know love if they saw it? Take a few moments to talk about it with your neighbour. How would you explain love?

I don't know about you, but I find it to be incredibly complicated. First, there are different kinds of love. Love for a child, love for a sibling, love for a partner. Then, perhaps we attempt to weigh each kind of love. Is one more important than another? If so, then why? Maybe we succeed in coming up with some kind of order for these various loves. Only to find that it really depends on circumstances, that one love might outweigh another in one situation, but be outweighed itself in another. It just gets very complicated.

BUT...complicated does not mean that we give up and walk away. In fact while it can be a tempting response, we often find more joy in discovering a way through the complicated. It can mean that we need to invest more in working it all out, yet the pay-out can far outweigh the cost in the end.

So, I am going to invest in understanding what this love thing is all about. And I would like to invite you to join me on the journey. I have no idea where we are going to end up. It is highly likely that we will discover all sorts of twists and turns along the way. We may find ourselves exploring dead-ends and taking the long way around at times. We will probably come to points where we must agree to disagree – perhaps that is love in action? I know we will be challenged to think differently and certain that we will be called to act differently. There will be a cost to all this because all change requires moving from one place of being or thinking to another. In moving we pay by giving up whatever it is we are moving from. Some may consider the cost negligible. Others may feel it is too great a price to pay. At every moment of the way we need to be looking out for those around us, helping to support and encourage, challenge, and confront. We also need to be readying ourselves to be supported and encouraged, challenged, and confronted. I can say that because I know that there will be points along the way where each one of us struggle.

By now you may be wondering what you are letting yourself in for. I would love to be able to say, this is what is going to happen and this is where we will end up — a little like a tour guide. The truth is that I am as much along for the ride as anyone. The only difference is that I get to discover what comes next slightly before you do.

Enough of that. Let's dive into the complications and see what we come up with.

Let's begin some definitions. It may seem strange, but I want to start with a little bit of grammar. The basic building blocks of a sentence written in English are a noun and a verb. A noun is sometimes called a naming word and it refers to a person or object. For example, Jonah or football. A pronoun is a secondary way of referring to a person or object. She or it.

A verb is a doing word – it describes an action or condition. Sit or stand, or broken

A simple example of a noun or pronoun used together could be, 'Anna reads.' Another, 'He walks.' These are the most basic sentences. We often see them in children's reading books. Here is my granddaughter Rebekah with her first homework from school.

Once we have our noun and verb we can begin to modify them to make them more interesting. Tall Adam walks quickly. The noun and verb are there – Adam walks. The word, 'tall,' describes something about Adam – he is tall. The word, 'quickly,' tells us something about how he is walking.

After that everything gets complicated.

Here's the thing. Love can be both a noun as in the name of something – an emotion or feeling, and a verb – an action like, 'to love dearly.' In fact we could make a valid, though rather uninteresting sentence with the words, 'Love love,' meaning someone loves (an action) love (a feeling). It's no wonder we often find it confusing and difficult to explain what we mean when we talk about love.

But we've only just begun to get complicated. I have talked about the Greek words for love. Here's a quick refresher.

Eros: romantic, passionate love

Philia: intimate, authentic friendship

Ludus: playful, flirtatious love

Storge: unconditional, familial love

Philautia: self-love

Pragma: committed, companionate love

Agápe: empathetic, universal love

When we talk about love, love for a neighbour, love for ourselves, love for a child, love for a friend, love for a partner,... they're all different. And because we find it so difficult to explain what we mean we often end up confusing one love for another. It is where, 'I love working with you,' edges over into, 'I love your friendship,' and then into unintended romance. It's where, 'I love work,' can take the place of, 'I love my child,' or, 'I love my partner.' And where, 'I love myself,' is ridiculed and made fun of as something that seems not quite right. Often it is not our intent to get wrapped up in these things, it happens because we have failed to name what is happening. And when you don't or can't name what is going on it is very difficult to discern whether what is happening is a good thing or not so good.

I'm planning to dig into the discernment side of things in another message. For now, as we get into the topic I think we need to understand that discerning good relationships requires having suitable language. I realise that not everyone is a scholar of the English language. I'm quite sure there are several of you listening today who could school me in all my inaccuracies and mistakes as far as that is concerned. But let me put it this way. If a builder rocks up to Mitre 10 and says, 'I'm building a thingymibob and I need a couple of whatchamacallits to go in the whateveritis,' the builder is unlikely to get what they require. Or if a farmer runs into the store for his wife and says, 'I have to get some whosiwhatsits for the cakethingy she's making.' Chances are he won't get whatever it was he was supposed to pick up on the way home. Even those of us who struggle with language understand that getting it right matters. Your right and mine may differ to some extent, but in the end, to be able to discern together we need to have a common point of beginning.

So it is with love. When we read, 'Beloved, let us love one another,' we need a common understanding, a common definition, else without it we will never be able to come together.

Let me head toward the end today with a small beginning on that common understanding. 1 Corinthians 13 is the famous chapter on love. Often read at weddings it begins to delve into how we might understand what love is all about. I don't think it is the last word on the matter. But it's a great place to begin. Verses 4-8 will do us for now.

⁴Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵ or rude. Here we find a list of things that love is, and love is not. Let's put the list up, all the love is on one side and all the is not on the other.

Love is patient, kind, rejoices in the truth, bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things, never ends.

Love is not envious, boastful, arrogant, rude, irritable, resentful, does not insist on its own way, or rejoice in wrongdoing.

I'm thinking it's quite a list to work through.

1 John 4:8 tells us, 'Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.' Taking what we can see from 1 Corinthians and folding it into 1 John makes it an interesting read...

Beloved, let us be patient and kind with each other, rejoicing in truth bearing with each other, believing each other, hoping for each other, endure with each other. Let us not be envious or boastful, arrogant or rude, irritable or resentful, not insisting on our way or rejoicing in wrongdoing. All that because that is how God is.

You can see why we just say, 'Beloved, let us love one another.' It's so much shorter. And you can also see why we need the rest to help us to understand what we actually mean.

I believe it's time for us as God's people to work through what we actually mean and then to put it into action. We won't ever get it all right. We will make mistakes and misunderstand each other. And we will learn, ever so slowly, to love one another, because love is from God.

We Pray

God of love, God who is love, God who loves us. It is true to say that we are often slow to hear and understand what you require of us. We mishear, we misrepresent, we do what we want and then wonder why the rest of the world looks at us and wants nothing to do with us. Help us to learn what it means to truly love as you love. Help us to put aside all those love is nots, take up the love is, and be love for our community and our nation.

In the name of Jesus who showed us his love with his life. Amen.
