<sup>7</sup> Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. <sup>8</sup> Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. <sup>9</sup> God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. <sup>10</sup> In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. <sup>11</sup> Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. <sup>12</sup> No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

# Message Let's get practical

God who is at work in each of us, would you prepare us to live for you. As we consider your Word today may we have soft hearts and willing minds to receive what you have for each of us. Amen.

How many of you have ever played a sport or an instrument or learnt a new craft? I'm picking pretty much everyone. One of the few things that ties nearly everything we do together is that in order to get better at something we need to practice. I played volleyball for a number of years in Dunedin. For the most part we turned up on Monday night, played for a couple of hours and then headed home again. But every two years the Masters games came along. And our team would get serious and we would practice, sometimes twice a week for several weeks beforehand. And surprise! We got better. We got better as individuals and we got better as a team. All because we were putting in the effort to practice and develop skills that you simply don't work on when you are just playing a game together.

It works for sport. It definitely works for music. It works for card games and puzzle solving. It works for cooking and gardening. Whenever we want to get better at something we practice. And the more we practice, the better we get. Turn to your neighbour and give an example of how you got better at something through practice.

This practice thing even works in church. The first time you attend a church everything they do is foreign. The standing up and sitting down, the words people sometimes say together, the singing. It's all a bit weird and unsettling. If you manage to get past the first week and come back it's not quite so unsettling. You know that people are going to stand and sit at different times. You've not quite figured out when, but it's not such a surprise when they do. And then, maybe at week three you're on to it, in fact you're so on to it that you stand a bit earlier than everyone else – whoops! That was embarrassing. Maybe the music isn't quite so strange now. You still have no idea what half the words mean and some of them a just gross, like this one...

Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine! Oh, what a foretaste of glory divine! Heir of salvation, purchase of God, born of his Spirit, washed in his blood.

But with time, a little research, you begin to get what is going on. The practice begins to pay off. You might even begin to get quite good at it. Practice is helping you to turn the conscious incompetence into unconscious competence.

I think that love is kind of similar. For many of us, the first time we discover love for someone else we have little or no idea what to do with it. How do we process these weird feelings that have so suddenly beset us? Why do we feel

this way and what to do about it? Of course, I'm talking about Eros love here, those feelings for another person that can lead to so much more.

And it strikes me that Agape love requires practice too. I think in part because Agape love generally doesn't strike us unaware. It doesn't sneak up on us and go, 'Surprise.' It doesn't suddenly pop up unannounced and demand to be taken care of. No, Agape love is a deliberate, purposeful love, considered, and intentional. It requires us to think and act in a way that is never accidental. It's not like me serving a volleyball and being pleasantly surprised when I actually manage a good serve. All of which suggests to me that if we are going to become expert in Agape love we need to get in some practice.

Which of course begs the question, 'How do you practice Agape love?' 'What are the things we can do to improve our skills?' I have to confess that I am no expert on the practice of Agape love. But I do like to think I have done a fair bit of practicing over the years — not so much on the love thing — I think I'm pretty naff at that — but on all sorts of other activities. And I'm pretty sure the principles will carry over, for the most part at least.

These principles are not original. I have read things that are similar and they seem to give a good beginning point for us to work from. So here we go...

Principles for practicing Agape Love

Principle 1: Have high expectations that encourage engagement and selfawareness

Principle 2: Support each other to work together and involve everyone

Principle 3: Learn to construct and apply new knowledge

Principle 4: Assess our progress and learn from feedback

Principle 5: Taking it into the real world matters

Principle 6: It works best when we do it together

We likely all know that saying, if you aim at nothing you're sure to hit it. I have been encouraged to hear so many people have been connecting with this subject of Agape love. I also know that moving from saying, 'I like that idea,' to actually doing something about it can be a big leap. So from here on in I'm kind of heart in mouth because if you're not with me on this it's really a little pointless.

I want to ground all this in 1 John 4:21 '... those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.' We are not practicing love for some good idea or gee whiz concept. We are practicing because it is absolutely central to who we

claim to be as Christians. Those who love God MUST love their brothers and sisters also. This is not a love God, would you like salt with that? It is far more fundamental to our self-identity. Without love for our brothers and sisters we cannot claim to love God. And without love for God I would hesitate to claim to be Christian. So loving our brothers and sisters is a baseline. It is where we begin. With that in mind, let's look at Principle 1.

Have high expectations that encourage engagement and self-awareness So there are three parts to this principle.

The first is high expectations, the second is encouraging engagement and the third is self-awareness. We need to begin by asking what we mean when we say high expectations in regard to loving our brothers and sisters. What do we expect? What would be a high expectation? What would be a low expectation?

Because this is about putting love into practice I want to suggest that a low expectation would be that we exhibit signs of Agape love around our close friends and family. It's a good place to start, right? But it is at the low end of what we would be hoping to see. Think about the people you know and like. You get on with them well and enjoy their company. Even there, sometimes, Agape love can be a bit stretched when they say or do something that gets on your nerves. For the most part though, you can manage it without too much effort and minimal outside help.

I'm not going to work through different levels here. I'm sure you can work them out for yourself. Let's go right to the high expectations. That would be where you actively look for how to love those who are difficult to love. You check in on yourself and ask how you're doing. You look for ways to love more deeply and more keenly. It is hard, energy sapping, and you need to constantly press into Jesus to sustain this kind of love in action while supporting and being supported by others around you. I don't know about you, but I feel tired just thinking about it. Of course, as with any skill or talent, the more we practice the easier it gets.

What about encouraging engagement? We think what we say and do with our brothers and sisters and we look for ways that we can work together, do life together, that encourage and build up. We are conscious of when someone is struggling and we get along side and support them. I used to be in Boys Brigade, a long time ago. The Boys were always divided up into squads and everything we did came back to how well our squad did as a team. Much to my

frustration I was always given the slow, the difficult, the boys that struggled to keep up. Incredibly competitive I worked my guts out to bring my guys up to speed so that we had a chance of winning the different competitions through the year. Some years even coming second was a huge achievement. But we often won. And then the next year I would get a new bunch of slow and difficult. It made me so mad!

One night I sat down with my parents after Boys Brigade and moaned about what I kept ending up with. They pointed out the reason I got them was I was really good at helping them succeed. Something many of them might never have managed otherwise. Without even realising it, I was encouraging engagement. I looked for ways we could succeed as a team and worked hard at it. I helped the slow ones, walked with the difficult ones, supported the struggling ones. And unrealised by me, I was better at it than anyone else. I could blame wanting to win at all costs — which would be true to an extent. But it was more than that. I wanted my team to be successful and unconsciously realised that to do that we had to work together to encourage each other. In love it is being patient and kind, bearing and hoping and believing in and for the other. It is loving the unlovely because God loved me first.

Which brings me to the third part of our principle. Self-awareness. Some people are naturally self-aware. They understand what is happening in their thinking. This is not being self-conscious. Self-aware people tend to be much less self-conscious than others. They examine their ideas and actions looking for what sets them off, what they struggle with, the things that energise them and the things that drain them. They know when they need to stop. And they know when they need to start. None of which necessarily means they obey the internal signals, but they are aware of that too. They are conscious of their natural inclinations to love some and not others. They take note of what makes them recoil and think about how they might respond differently. They tend to be the exceptions.

Most of us have to work at being self-aware. We must be deliberate in stopping to ask those questions of ourselves. Why did I do that? What caused me to react the way I did? How can I respond differently in the future? It can be quite difficult and stressful when we are new to it.

Applied to love self-awareness causes us to pause and ask these questions of ourselves and work to discover the answers. It allows me to ask of myself, 'Was that a loving action?' 'Was it the best action for the other?' 'How can I love

more deeply in future?' The best part is that we can apply these questions corporately as well as individually. Why do we as the people of God here in this place respond in this particular manner? How can we do better next time?

Put all of this together in the principle and we get: setting high expectations in the love we have for each other, learning to encourage each other as we work out that love, and thinking about what and how we love and how we can do better at it.

There may be some of you thinking, if that was principle one we are going to be here for hours! Well, yeah, but not today. I do want to leave you with a bit of homework. Over the coming week I want you to think about those three aspects of the principle. High expectations, encouraging engagement and self-awareness. And I want you to think about what you need to work on and maybe how you are going to begin. Then, next week, let's talk about it together.

#### We Pray
