Reading 1 John 4:7-21

⁷ Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹ God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰ In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning

sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹ Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

¹³ By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Saviour of the world. ¹⁵ God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶ So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷ Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸ There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹ We love because he first loved us. ²⁰ Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹ The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Message It's not about me

Homework: High expectations, encouraging engagement and self-awareness. Think about what you need to work on and maybe how you are going to begin. Turn to a neighbour and talk about what you have done this week in response to the homework.

I've been thinking about the homework too. As I pondered I realised that there is a clear and present danger to all this love stuff. The danger is that I allow my personal feelings, my brokenness, to bleed over into my practice of Agape love. At which point it is no longer Agape because it moves from being about the other to being about me. I begin to look to fulfil my own needs by seeking them in others. A completely over the top example of this is the parents who attempt to live out their hopes and dreams through their children. I'm talking the parents yelling at the kids or the ref on the rugby pitch or the pushing them to perform beyond any reasonable limit. More on that as we go.

Last week we looked at the first of six principles of practice that I think can help us to think about love and to act in a way that reflects love. Today we are going to get into the next two principles.

Principle 2

Support each other to work together and involve everyone.

Of course, this really follows directly on from our first principle of having high expectations that encourage engagement. Those high expectations will call on us to be supportive of each other. There are a whole range of reasons for that and I want to take some time to think about some of those.

The first is that I can't do it all on my own. I am amazing, talented, intelligent, and incredibly good-looking, and I am only one person. I can't be everywhere. Elon Musk with all his billions of dollars and artificial intelligence can't be everywhere. I am bound to a single spot at any particular point in time. So, if I am dealing with something over here and an issue comes up over there, I can't be there doing that as well. Now we could get into the talent and intelligence and whether they are useful measures of anything at all another time. But even if I were the absolute best person for both jobs, I simply can't do it.

The second is that for all my amazingness there are somethings I am not equipped to do. I have a total mental block when it comes to keeping things tidy. I can follow instructions to put things away, but left to myself entropy takes over and chaos ensues. And that's just a simple example. There are many, many things I can't do, or at least I can't do well.

The third is that I get tired. Even if I could be everywhere at once and achieve everything to a high standard I just get tired. My energy levels drop and I need to rest and recuperate. While I am resting I'm not doing everything else.

And finally, should I be able to work tirelessly and without sleep, I only bring one perspective. I can only see what I can see. Take mathematics for example. I love numbers so I cannot understand why some people struggle with them. It's obvious to me that numbers can open up a whole new world of possibilities. So if you say to me that numbers make no sense I am left confused and befuddled that something so obvious to me wouldn't be obvious to you. Or to take an example in the other direction. For the most part I just don't get emotions. I don't understand why people respond to things emotionally in the ways they do. I get that they do, and I have evolved appropriate responses that for the most part enable me to help a person feel understood, but honestly, I have no idea what's going on, most of the time. Possibly not something I should confess to as a minister, but there we are.

As you can see, I really need to support and be supported as we work together. And I need everyone around me to be involved. There is not a person listening today who doesn't have something to offer that I can't provide. Wow! That's a lot of negatives. Everyone here has something to offer that I will either struggle to come up with or could never come up with. It might be just the right words, or the right kind of help, or the right kind of being present. Just so many things that we bring to serve and support each other.

The thing is, the words of 1 Corinthians 13 slip so easily over our lips:

⁴Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵ or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; ⁶ it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. ⁷ It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

But when things get difficult being patient and kind and not being irritable or resentful is hard. And if you are in it on your own, without support or encouragement it can be next to impossible. Now please, I am not alluding to me here. I am talking about the Agape love that I believe God is calling us into as God's people. I'm talking about how we love a person with a difficult personality or with addictions or struggles that we don't understand or can't fix. Even the person who has done or is doing something we don't believe we can ever accept. Imagine for a moment you are sitting in church with a prostitute sitting on one side of you and a drug addict on the other. In a community that is recognised for its Agape love the chances are high that could happen. How will you go, accepting them as they are and loving them as they are? Not as they might be or could be, but as they are. That's the kind of love that needs everyone involved and working together.

It's also where principle 3 comes into play.

Learn to construct and apply new knowledge

Who here knows the best way to deal with a person who arrives at church inebriated and friendly? Or how to support a person who is wanting to come off drugs? Or how to support a young person struggling with their sexuality? Or how to support a person struggling with having had an abortion? This is tough stuff. Some people have excellent training and understanding. Most of us have little or no idea what to do. And so we have to learn. Together.

That does not mean that we must start from scratch. There are experts who can help us, professionals who will do the heavy lifting while we support. There are a whole raft of people issues that we have no business meddling with. But

we can still love and encourage. And it is that learning to love and encourage without stepping over appropriate boundaries that is where our principle comes into play.

Remember the first 3 verses of 1 Corinthians 13:

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. ² And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. ³ If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

We learn to love in such a way that what we do and say is gain. We speak with love, we prophesy with love, we practice faith with love. It is very different from what could kindly be called meddling. It is not about attempting to fix someone. It is not about making ourselves feel better because we have helped another person.

And this is where I want to come back to my earlier comments. Agape love is about serving the other. That temptation to try to fix people is probably universal. It's the parent trying to ensure their son or daughter will play for the All Blacks or the Black Ferns because they never quite made it. It's the talk about how you're not making enough of your life, or the desire to set people up with others. None of that is Agape love. Serving another is about listening for God's heart for that person and doing your best to respond with love. It might mean saying or doing nothing while you are itching to go into fixit mode. It might even mean saying or doing something that goes against what you've believed all your life about something. Yet God says, love that person who doesn't fit your idea of right or proper or correct. And so you do. God says, love that person who is or does differently to you. And so you do.

And you do it learning all the way. And you do it with the support and encouragement of those around you. And then they will know us by our love.

I gave you a little homework last week. I want to give you some this week too. I want you to think about how you would need to support to love someone who is unlovely. Imagine that it is someone on the fringes, involved in things that make you uncomfortable or even afraid. What kind of support would you want from those around you and how would you get it?

We Pray

God who loves the unlovely. Who loves us. Every one of us desperately needs to be loved. Every one of us needs to love in return. And yet we can be so bad at it. We try to love on our own. We turn love into something about us. We miss out on the support of those around us because it can seem too hard to love together. Teach us to love to the gain of those we love. Teach us to involve everyone in our practice of love. Teach us to set aside our own wants and desires and love as you love us. In Jesus name we pray. Amen.
