The Peace

Reading 1 Luke 4:1-4

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, ² where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. ³ The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." ⁴ Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'"

Reflection 1

As I pondered the scripture for today, I couldn't help thinking of the song by the Spice Girls, 'Wannabe.' In it they sing, 'Now tell me what you want, what you really, really want.' It seemed like a very good summary of what today's reading is all about.

'Hey, Jesus, tell me what you want, what you really, really want.'

Before we begin to dig into what Jesus really, really wanted, let's take a moment to think about what we really, really want. I'll give you a minute to think about it then we can maybe have a go at making a bit of a list.

Just in case you are concerned that my list seems a little unbalanced I am going to come to the faith side of things next. I want us to focus in on those things that often stand in for faith, especially when things are more difficult.

Here's my list, I wonder how many things on my list are similar to yours.

- Connection with family and friends (Love)
- Food
- A safe, warm place to live
- Freedom to choose without people shouting at me or worse
- The ability to do the things that bring me fulfilment and satisfaction

It's fair to say that there would be a priority in the list should I have to choose, but I think that about covers what I really, really want.

Bringing faith into the story I would want to be able to have a living and dynamic relationship with Jesus.

The thing I find interesting is that it is exactly that list of things that the devil is focussing in on when he comes to tempt Jesus. I could call it sustenance,

connection, and choice. Those things that speak to our existence and identity. In other words, 'How do I live?' and, 'Who am I?'

We could go all philosophical and look at sayings like Descartes, 'I think, therefore I am.' Or Shakespeare's, "This above all: to thine own self be true..." All of which bears thinking about but is a little deeper than we have time to go today.

Rather, I want to take some time with the practical details of why these are temptations and how insidious they can become if we take our eyes off the ball.

We shall begin at the beginning. Food. To this I will add shelter and clothing as they are all of a kind – physical needs that every living creature has in one way or another. If we do not get enough of any of these we will likely die. So the question then is, 'How is it a temptation to need to eat?' And the answer is that it is not a temptation to need food. If any one of us was at the end of 40 day fast it is perfectly appropriate to be ravenously hungry. The temptation here is of a very different kind. The devil plays on Jesus' privileged position as the Son of God. You have the power to do anything you want. You don't have to be subject to the limitations of normal human beings. Why be hungry when you have such power at your disposal?

Jesus' response is short and to the point. 'One does not live by bread alone.' In other words, 'It's not about what I want, it is about what God wants.' I suspect that deep, deep down most of us struggle with that concept. I don't want to cast nasturtiums so I will speak to me and you can judge for yourself. In my head I get that God comes first. I understand the concept that all I have belongs first and foremost to God. That I live and move and have my being in God alone. And I regularly find my head and my heart clashing on the details of how that looks. Does it mean I sell all I have and give it to the poor? Surely then I would be poor and reliant on others and what is the point of that? What does it look like to rely on God alone? Do I have to live without anywhere to lay my head to properly emulate Christ? I don't think I have the courage to do that by choice. I think that it is this weakness in me that the devil was hoping to exploit in Jesus. Of course, you are all much more controlled than I am, but I get it if you struggle, just a little bit. More in a moment. Let's sing together.

Reading 2 Luke 4:5-13

Reflection 2

The second temptation we find is what I will call the temptation of connection. For Jesus this came in the form of worship – would he worship the devil in exchange for the adulation of the world? We can be sure the devil wasn't making it up because it would not otherwise be any kind of temptation. In effect the devil was saying that by forming a relationship with him, Jesus could short circuit the journey to the cross. He could save all the heartache and pain.

¹³ When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

Just come over to the devil's side and the job would be done, quickly and painlessly. Jesus' relationship with God would be severed, but everything else would be so much easier. And everyone would like him. How cool would that be!?

Just like the first temptation all of us experience this in some form or another. For some it is the longing for relationships lost. For others it can be a craving for recognition or even power. We search for shortcuts to obtain what we desire. We tend to only notice this sort of behaviour in deranged lunatics like Donald Trump or Vladimir Putin. Their naked abuse of power to obtain what they want – the adulation of the crowd, the restoration of historical glory would be comical if it didn't have such ghastly consequences for normal people. But how different are we, really? What might we do in a place of absolute power? What might we do if we could reset our relationships or restore broken connections? I think the old map warnings, 'There lie dragons,' would be a suitable response. It puts my in mind of the movie Bruce Almighty when Bruce responds to every prayer with, 'Yes.' Chaos and disaster is the outcome.

Jesus sees through the devil's offer to understand the outcome of stepping out of relationship, of connection with God. God's way may seem to be filled with pain and disappointment, but it is far better than the alternative.

Lastly, we come to the temptation of choice. 'You can choose to do anything you like, Jesus. Look, step off this tall building and you will suffer no consequences.' Jesus' response is to be obedient to call God has placed on his life.

I think this is the most insidious of the temptations. There is a sense in which it doesn't really matter beyond an appeal to Jesus' vanity. Are you really who you say you are? The desire to prove that the devil is talking to the actual Son of God must have been strong by now. Put the devil in his place, show him who is boss here.

It raises the question of who is boss in our lives. Does God genuinely get to choose how I live? Or is it a case of me giving God a little bit here and there just to keep things moving along. I'm really the one in charge of my life and God gets a look in when I am in the right mood. I've had a good week this week – what would you like me to do today. It's been a bit of a struggle this week, you can wait, God, until I'm feeling better.

I could see it as a rather controversial Christian Tui billboard — Everything I am is yours, God. Yeah, Right! I know, not going to make many people happy with that quip, in part because most of us know it is true, even if we won't admit it in public. Perhaps the song should go, 'Everything I am, well, most of it, or at least some of it, sometimes, is yours, God.' It's not an attempt to be mean. It is being honest about our humanity. Even Paul admitted to not getting it right all the time. I think it should be OK for us to admit the same.

In the end, my point is that the temptations the devil visited on Jesus are the same temptations all of us face every day. Jesus showed us a way to deal with those temptations – it may work for us sometimes and not so much at other times. The great thing is that God knows. God understands. And God loves us anyway. I suspect that the most important detail the devil doesn't want us to notice is that the temptations weren't really the main issue. The main issue was Jesus' relationship with God. It is the same main issue for you and for me. Not, 'How did I screw up today?' but 'How is my relationship with God?' That really is the most important detail.

We Pray

God of thieves, prostitutes, and beggars, we come to you knowing we fall to temptation with dismaying frequency. No sooner do we think we have found a high point than we are falling off our self-made pedestals, seemingly right back where we started. Help us to get better at seeing the temptations coming and keeping them beyond arm's length. And help us to get better at coming to you when we fail and restoring our relationship with you. In Jesus, through Jesus, we pray. Amen.
