The Peace

Reading 1 Luke 13:1-5

At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. ² He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? ³ No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. ⁴ Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? ⁵ No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

Reflection 1

Sometimes we come to something in the Bible that is difficult to understand. Often that is because we have no way of understanding the context in which it was written. What did the original listeners understand? How did it make sense to them in the midst of their everyday concerns and worries? Then we come to this reading and it seems horrific and unnecessary, talking about events and experiences for which we have little or no conception.

When we add in the fact that we have different concepts of sin and punishment it becomes difficult to work out what is going on. All of which means we need to not only translate the words, we also need to reorient the story itself so it makes some kind of sense in our context.

Let me give you an example of language that needs multiple levels of translation. "Cracked him, go right. 3 coming in from the left. Camper in that tower. Downed one. Armour here. GG guys, I'll be AFK for 5." Not only do we need to translate things like the abbreviations; none of it makes sense unless you actually have some idea of what a first-person shooter even is. Many of you may not have even heard of a first-person shooter. To a computer game player it's obvious what is going on because it is their context.

Let's keep that in mind as we ponder what Jesus has to say in our reading today. The first sentence is particularly gruesome and seemingly has no relationship to our experiences today. Animal sacrifices and murder are not a part of our public order. To tie this into the idea that the event may have been the result of some kind of terrible sin is akin to certain people claiming that the 185 deaths in the Christchurch earthquake were linked to homosexuality in the community. There is a deep disconnect between the story as it is told and what our lived experience tells us is right and that can be enough to cause us to miss the deeper point.

I want to come to what I think is the deeper point in a moment. First, let's think about what may have been going on in the minds of Jesus' listeners 2000 years ago. The truth of the Galilean incident is lost in history. It may have been that the Galileans were part of an attempted uprising, a not uncommon event in those times. Or they may have simply been unfortunate enough to anger the governor on a bad day. Whatever the motivations behind the event, the people of the day would have immediately applied their fate to the idea that God punishes sinners. In other words, they must have done something really bad and so God was giving them their comeuppances. The same thing for those killed by the falling tower in Siloam. They had obviously done something bad for the disaster to happen. To these listeners it was God's way of showing everyone that they couldn't get away with bad behaviour. We see the same attitude in the story of the lame man lowered through the roof when the assumption is made that the lame man must have committed some terrible sin to have ended up lame.

The other side of this understanding was that I am obviously better than those hurt or killed, because I wasn't hurt or killed. All of which is really no different to someone who goes to church and thinks they are better than those who don't because they are, 'SAVED.' It is this attitude of, 'holier than thou,' that I think Jesus is getting at here.

Notice how verse 3 and verse 5 are the same. Jesus is trying to get a point across here. You cannot look at other people and think you are better than them, more deserving of God's mercy simply because of your circumstances. The stories that lead into this conclusion could be nearly anything – I don't have Covid, but other people do so I must be better than them. Those terrible people in prison have done awful things, I'm not in prison so I must be better than them. How about the people in the Christchurch mosque attack, or the people of Ukraine, or the Houthi in Yemen, or any people afflicted by disease

or disaster? Am I better than any of them? Jesus is saying here, 'No, you are not better than any of those.' We are all on the same level and we all need God's mercy equally. Maybe that is why the proverbial tower is falling on the church – because God wants us to look for our salvation in Jesus and not in our own goodness and this is the only way to get our attention. Just a thought...

Reading 2 Luke 13:6-9

The Parable of the Barren Fig Tree

⁶ Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. ⁷ So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' ⁸ He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. ⁹ If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.'"

Reflection 2

Jesus really doesn't beat around the bush! This parable leads directly on from our first reading. If we read it in this context it suddenly makes a whole lot more sense. The same people who were listening to Jesus talk about the Galileans and those killed by the tower of Siloam are listening here. That means they know that this parable is about them. And they know that they are represented by the fig tree.

Let's put ourselves in the story. We have just come to Jesus, full of selfrighteousness because of the disasters that have befallen people living just down the road. The first thing Jesus does to burst our bubble is to suggest that we are no different to those people in terms of our need for God's mercy. Now for the sucker punch.

'See, I have been looking for fruit on this tree for 3 years and still I find none.' If God were to come up to you and say these words, what would have to say for yourself? How would you go about explaining what fruit you have produced? Keep in mind that this is for an audience of one and that audience already knows what you have been up to. I don't know about you, but I would find it incredibly confronting. What fruit do I have to show for the last 3 years? Not only that, but the owner of the fig tree proceeds to tell the gardener to cut the tree down because it is wasting the soil.

Fortunately for tree, and for me, we have an advocate – the gardener. 'Let me work on it for one more year. I will turn the soil and feed it well. Then if that doesn't work, we will cut it down.' Wow! A bit of a lifeline there. Things were sounding pretty grim for a moment there.

Here's my question though. Is this like an annual check-up? Does God check in on the 31st of March every year to make sure we are living up to expectations? And what do those expectations look like in real life? How would I know if I was bearing fruit? Do I have a quota of salvations and invitations I need to fulfil? Or is it measured in number of verses read and prayers prayed? Or is it something else I'm equally unlikely to measure up against?

Personally, I think it is none of the above. I think the fruit is best measured in Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness and Self-control. It's not about getting them all lined up in neat rows. It's about getting a little better at some part of it. The turning of the soil and the manure is the work of the Holy Spirit, and the fruit is the growth of these things in our lives. We definitely have a role to play in growing in the fruit and God is looking for how we allow the Spirit to mould us into true followers of Jesus. And maybe, just maybe, if we get that right the tower might fall on empty ground. What do you think?

We Pray

Merciful God, we know that we do not deserve your love and kindness. There is nothing about what we do that can earn us a way out of disaster. Instead, you chose us before we knew you and you send the Holy Spirit to work away at our fruitlessness so that we don't need to be cut down. Teach us to trust you and allow you to mould us into people who fully represent you to the world. Amen.
