Reading Joshua 6:1-6

The Fall of Jericho

Now the gates of Jericho were tightly shut because the people were afraid of the Israelites. No one was allowed to go out or in. <sup>2</sup> But the LORD said to Joshua, "I have given you Jericho, its king, and all its strong warriors. <sup>3</sup> You and your fighting men should march around the town once a day for six days. <sup>4</sup> Seven priests will walk ahead of the Ark, each carrying a ram's horn. On the seventh day you are to march around the town seven times, with the priests blowing the horns. <sup>5</sup> When you hear the priests give one long blast on the rams' horns, have all the people shout as loud as they can. Then the walls of the town will collapse, and the people can charge straight into the town."

<sup>6</sup> So Joshua called together the priests and said, "Take up the Ark of the LORD's Covenant, and assign seven priests to walk in front of it, each carrying a ram's horn." <sup>7</sup> Then he gave orders to the people: "March around the town, and the armed men will lead the way in front of the Ark of the LORD."

### Reflection

Learning a new skill. Drawing a whale.

We all know that learning a new skill can take time. A very long time ago while I was just 13 a friend and I spent the summer playing table tennis, up to 8 hours a day, 6 days a week. We constantly pushed each other to get better but aside from having a heap of fun we didn't really think much of it. Until we went back to school. Michael decided to join his school's table tennis team. Without even trying he beat the best senior player on their squad. 300 hours of concentrated practice can do that for you. There's a saying that it takes 10000 hours of practice to become an expert. Turns out it isn't true, but it does point toward a truth – the more you work at something the better you will get. I want to dig into how that relates to what we have been learning about creating in a moment, but first, let's think about Joshua and the Israelites marching on Jericho.

The first thing we should remember is that Joshua didn't simply march up, walk around the city a few times and everything fell down. There was much more to it than that. You may remember the spies hidden by Rahab. They weren't there on holiday, they were there to take a measure of the city, to scope out the defences and observe the movement and numbers of soldiers. There was planning that went into this battle. Planning that likely went over several months. There would have been scouts checking out the surrounding territory. Lookouts in place to observe the flow of people in and out of the city. Soldiers being trained. Logistics prepared. The seven days of walking around Jericho was simply the final piece of the puzzle to all the work and preparation that had gone on beforehand.

At the point of marching around the city it is easy to imagine everything fell down and somehow the rest of the city evaporated. I need to pop a few bubbles at this point. Jericho was a fortified town with likely around 2500 inhabitants of whom probable a fifth were soldiers. It covered an area of around 9 acres or 3.6 hectares. To put that in perspective it's around about 3.5 rugby pitches. Marching around an area this size isn't going to take all day, maybe an hour since they would have had to keep some distance away from the walls to avoid missiles thrown by the defenders. In fact it is likely that there wouldn't have been more than a few thousand attackers in the march because otherwise the head would meet the tail and be totally confusing. What I'm

saying is that the scale of the affair is much smaller than most of us have usually assumed.

Even on this smaller scale, planning and preparation was necessary. Everyone involved in the attack needed to know what was expected of them and how they were to behave in the process. When the walls fell down each man had a job to do. All of this would have taken time. It is likely that the time between the spies scoping out the fortress and the walls coming down would have been measure in months, not days or weeks. In the end, the act of destruction would have happened fairly quickly, but the lead-in time was significant. I wrestled with this a little, but I do want to say that this is a magnificent story with ugly undertones. Very little is made of the fact that only Rahab and her family were the only people to escape from Jericho alive. God gets the blame for apparently insisting everything of Jericho was to be utterly destroyed. I'm not sure that the God of Jesus Christ would have asked for that. I think this is an example of people taking God's real instruction well beyond its intent and using God as justification for an act of atrocity – something that unfortunately continues to happen in places even today. But that is not what we are focusing on here. No matter what we think of how the Israelites dealt with Jericho it is a useful reminder that nothing is instant, even coffee requires water to be boiled.

I'm going to pivot away from all this now and invite you to think a little more deeply about creating. What is creating? Early on I defined creating as adding something good to the world. We have dug into what that means and thought about a whole range of different ways in which we can add good to the world, from a friendly smile to tending the garden to making something. All of which is wonderful stuff. And we can go deeper. We have talked about how we are co-creators with God and this is where I think it gets really interesting. If we are co-creators with God, then it is important to remember that we can't just bowl on ahead and do whatever seems good to us. Imagine being on a sports team where every player just did whatever they liked on the field. It would be chaos at best and unlikely to be much fun for anyone. Now think of that team working together to achieve a common goal. Perhaps not exactly what every individual would want for themselves, but so much more satisfying.

What might it look like if we were to become a team with God, working together to achieve a common goal? What incredible things would we see creating not merely as individuals, but as members of a group focused together to co-create with God?

# Reading Matthew 25:1-13

Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. <sup>2</sup> Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. <sup>3</sup> When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; <sup>4</sup> but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. <sup>5</sup> As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. <sup>6</sup> But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' <sup>7</sup> Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. <sup>8</sup> The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' <sup>9</sup> But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' <sup>10</sup> And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. <sup>11</sup> Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' <sup>12</sup> But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' <sup>13</sup> Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.

#### Reflection

I like working as part of a team. Instead of having to do everything myself I can rely on others around me to pick up parts of the task that I can't do so well. There are opportunities to see and hear other perspectives and ways of doing things. We can celebrate each other's successes and find support in our failures. It's also more demanding because when I rely on someone else to do something I am trusting them. Often they don't do things like I would. Sometimes they do things in a way that makes me cringe. I have to breathe deeply and encourage and support so everything comes together in the best way possible. All of which takes time. Sometimes lots of time. Sometimes time that I would rather spend on other things.

When I lived in Dunedin I played on a social volleyball team. Because it was social and we wanted to make people feel welcome we sometimes had people who could be a little challenging in their skill level. For the most part we learnt to play in a way that hopefully ensured their enjoyment and our thirst for success – we were pretty competitive! I think all of us would have nights when our frustration at limited skill levels would boil over, but let's face it, none of us were exactly world class anyway.

As we think about the bridesmaids in our reading I find myself wondering why Jesus took such a long winded approach to telling people to stay awake because they don't know the day or hour. In the first place, no-one can stay awake 24/7 – the longest anyone managed on record was 264 hours and the results weren't pretty with paranoia and hallucinations. Which leads one to think that Jesus wasn't talking about not sleeping. But what if he is talking about planning and teamwork and taking account of the time that is needed to bring that together? What if the image of staying awake is about learning to look out for each other and preparing together? For a long time I have thought that the wise bridesmaids were just mean. But it is more than that. They were selfish too. If they had cared at all about their 'friends' they would have helped make sure there was sufficient oil for everyone right from the beginning. This is a story about more than just thinking ahead. It is also about caring for others, or in this case not caring for others. Which brings us back to time. Because caring for others takes time.

I used to run youth group camps on a regular basis. One of the things we would do before going away on a camp was to go through the kids' gear to make sure they weren't missing anything important. Invariably there were

missing sleeping bags and towels and plates and cutlery and toothbrushes. It took an hour to do the prep and saved multiple hours at the other end having to sort out missing gear. That investment of time was worth every minute, but it was a real drag in the moment. The outcome was a much happier group of young people who didn't have to spend their time worrying about what they had forgotten or left behind. And a much happier group of leaders who weren't left with attempting to sort out kids with missing gear. As a result we all got to focus on the fun and challenges of camp.

This is where I want to bring everything together. It's fairly obvious that whenever we create something we invest our time into that process. What I think is perhaps too easily forgotten is the investment of time into getting to the point of creating in the first place. The practice time, the planning time, the preparation time. It's all too easy to go to a concert and hear a great performance and forget that it has taken thousands of hours of hard slog to get the concert ready for your enjoyment. The same goes for co-creating with God. It requires an investment of our time in practice and planning and preparation. That may be prayer or studying the Scriptures, it may be the work of building displays or practicing instruments. It may be meeting people and building relationship so that trust is built, and questions can be asked without fear. It may be a whole multitude of things I have never even touched on. Our challenge, here and now, is to press into God and find out what we need to be practicing, what we need to be planning, how we need to be preparing. Some of that has been going on ever since we were born. More since we met Jesus. Some of it needs to begin now.

How have you practiced, planned, and prepared? What time have you invested into co-creating with God? And more importantly, what comes next?
