THE PEACE OF CHRIST

THE CHURCH'S ONE FOUNDATION (WOV 385)

The Church's one foundation is Jesus Christ her Lord: she is the new creation by water and the word;

Yet she on earth hath union with God the Three in One, and mystic sweet communion with those whose rest is won. O happy ones and holy! Lord, give us grace that we, like them, the meek and lowly, on high may dwell with thee.

1st READING Revelation 21:1-5a (NRSV)

The new heaven and the new earth

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

"See, the home of God is among mortals.

He will dwell with them as their God;

they will be his peoples,

and God himself will be with them:

he will wipe every tear from their eyes.

Death will be no more:

mourning and crying and pain will be no more,

for the first things have passed away."

And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new."

MESSAGE PART 1: 'The Best Dwelling Place'

Making a house a home can be hard work. The kind of work that's messy and time-consuming but ultimately worthwhile and satisfying, especially if done yourself. DIY (Do It Yourself) home maintenance is much to be admired. In theory, it's great – given the right tools, time and know how. But, undertaken recklessly, it can prove to be a dangerous occupation... as ACC (Accident Compensation Corporation) and no doubt some of you can attest. House painting seemed to be my parent's particular nemesis.

My mother once fell gracefully through our cherry tree to land, back-first, draped over our patios metal railing, when a ladder she'd mounted - to reach an awkward corner of the house with her paintbrush - lost its footing along with her. A first aid bag of frozen peas and a precautionary x-ray later, she got off relatively unscathed.

As for my father. Perhaps the most entertaining of his incidents was due to an intrepid chimney painting exercise. Never keen on heights, he'd mustered his courage to alight the ladder in his everyday attire, much to my mother's dismay. As she pointed out this oversight he refused to return to ground level, like any sensible human being, and instead got mum to chuck his old painting overalls up to him. I can still picture him writhing on the roof, clutching onto the chimney breast with one hand for support while worming his way into what turned out to be... mum's overalls.

She was 5 foot 4, he was 6 foot 1... it was not a pretty sight! Folded in half at altitude, circulation impaired and fuming with expletives, he was determined to paint the chimney despite being clamped into a permanently crouched yoga position. We were helpless with laughter. To his dying day he swore she'd done it on purpose. She hadn't. It was just one of life's delightfully serendipitous moments.

Fast forward two decades. During an on-site discussion concerning updating the original 1950's laundry, last painted by my DIY parents, a builder reassuringly remarked, "Your home might need some maintenance but she's a decent dwelling at heart." Good to know.

This put me in mind of these words attributed to a 12th century German-born monk and writer, with the unlikely name Hugh of St. Victor. "You will build a house for the Lord your God in and of yourself. He will be the craftsman, your heart the site, your thoughts the materials." Reassuringly adding, "Do not take fright because of your lack of skill; he who requires this of you is a skilful builder and he chooses others to be builders too."

This, in turn, reminded me of Paul's words to fellow Christians in Corinth.

After pointing out "We are partners working together for God," he continues "You are God's building (God's house). Using the gift that God gave me, I did the work of an expert builder and laid the foundation, and another is building on it. But each one must be careful how he builds. For God has already placed Jesus Christ as the one and only foundation, and no other foundation can be laid." (1Corinthians3:9-11)

Throughout the ages - worship sites, temples and churches - have all been built and dedicated to the glory of God. But while God sometimes chooses to temporarily inhabit a man-made space or meet us within such a setting, more than often than not God dwells in mystery, far beyond what we are capable of conceiving. Thankfully this didn't stop people developing ideas about what that holy dwelling place looked like or where, in time and space, it existed.

It was later Jewish thought that regarded the heavens above us as being divided into a number of different strata or spheres, the highest of which was understandably considered to be God's dwelling place.¹

While from Scripture - under meticulous instruction from God, Moses instigated the creation of a sacred tabernacle, a specially designed dwelling place for God. This Tent of the Lord's Presence, constructed and furnished by a host of skilled craftsman and artisans, proved to be God's Mobile Home. One that accompanied the Israelites throughout the desert wilderness where God's presence became their guiding cloud by day and fire by night. (Exodus Chapters 25-40)

Then, under King Solomon, came the promised construction of an established Temple in Jerusalem where God's dazzling presence chose, for a time, to reside. (1Kings Chapters 6-8 /2Chronicles Chapters 2-7)

Later, through the writings of the Prophet Ezekiel, the Lord's detailed vision of a future Temple and its workings were revealed. (Ezekiel Chapters 40-48)

All these spaces, these places, though built and dedicated to house God's glory, were only temporary, transitional housing... until we reach the book of Revelation.

Here we learn God will bring about something unheard of, something entirely new – new in time (neos) and in quality (kainos).

The same God, who declared through the Prophet Isaiah, "Do not cling to the events of the past, nor dwell on what happened long ago. Watch for the new thing I am going to do. It is happening already – you can see it now!" (Isaiah 43:18&19) That same God now chooses to dwell with, and within, people. Coming to us and meeting us where we are.

"See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them as their God; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them." (Revelation 21:3)
"See, I am making all things new." (Revelation 21:5a)

Or, as The Message Bible reads, "Look, God has moved into the neighbourhood, making his home with men and women! They're his people, he's their God." Itself an echo of 2nd Corinthians where "God has said, 'I will make my home with my people and live among them: I will be their God and they shall be my people."

But how? With a question of his own Paul reminds us, in rhetorical fashion, "Surely you know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit lives in you?" (1Corinthians 3:16)

For I'm building a people of power and I'm making a people of praise
That will move through this land by My Spirit and will glorify My precious name
Build your church, Lord.
Make us strong, Lord.
Join our hearts, Lord, through Your Son.
Make us one, Lord, in Your body, in the kingdom of Your Son. x2

2nd READING John 14:21-25 (NRSV)

The promise of the Holy Spirit

Jesus explains to his disciples,

"They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me, and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them."

Judas (not Iscariot) said to him, "Lord, how is it that you will reveal yourself to us and not to the world?"

Jesus answered him, "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words, and the word that you hear is not mine but is from the Father who sent me.

"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I have said to you."

MESSAGE PART 2: 'The Best Dwelling Place'

"In the days to come, says the Lord I will put my laws in them and write them on their hearts" (Jeremiah 31:31-34) These words from the Prophet Jeremiah remind us, change is an inside job, an undertaking only accomplished through internal access.

This seems to be what Jesus is trying to explain to his first disciples in John's Gospel where he says... "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them." (John14:23) Will actually set up residence and dwell within them, as expressed in our earlier Dialogue. This is by invitation only, as also noted in part of Paul's prayer to followers of Jesus living in Ephesus. "I ask him (God) to strengthen you by his Spirit – not a brute strength but a glorious inner strength – that Christ will live in you as you open the door and invite him in." (Ephesians 3:15 TMB)

At the time of Jesus' Ascension - his departure from earth and return to the Father – he reminded his disciples this meant the promised Holy Spirit would now come as a permanent Helper, Friend and Advocate to remain with them forever. To come alongside them, to teach and help them remember everything he'd told them. Pointing out, this would be in their and future followers long-term best interests, because his presence would now be personally and universally available by the Spirit, 24-7. As Jesus reassured them, and us alike, "I am telling you the truth. It is better for you that I go away, because if I do not go, the Helper will not come to you. But if I do go away, then I will send him to you." (John 14:7)

Don't know about you but I'm glad we haven't been left to our own devices. DIY is not all it's cracked up to be – there are times we need expert help. And the appropriately named Helper - The Holy Spirit - who, in this morning's context could loosely be described as our internal home handyman and interior designer, is with us. There, not for some slap-dash quick cosmetic fix but, to make things entirely new – new in time (neos) and in quality (kainos). There to expertly seek out, assess and repair damage, to make necessary upgrades, to declutter, renew and redecorate, then maintain upkeep – a lifelong task. All this home improvement sounds pretty good, and it is, however ongoing costs are involved - continued work, time, willingness and commitment on our part. Ask anyone here, I'm sure you'd agree, it's hard work making a house a home.

I've always lived in the same house. After my parents died (not due to painting accidents by the way) despite living there I still felt the psychological need move in then gradually bring about change to make the space my own – an ongoing task. When we welcome Jesus into our hearts, when we invite him in, the Holy Spirit comes to dwell within us. And so begins the adventure of a lifetime. The work of making us new from the inside out – new in time (neos) and in quality (kainos). A transformation brought about by the continual renewing of our minds (Romans 12:1&2) For it's as we allow the Holy Spirit, not simply to move in but to settle down, to fully inhabit and occupy our entire space - the house of our hearts - that a fundamental change begins to occur.

This takes time. But, over time, we gradually begin to understand and see things differently. To see as Jesus sees, love as he loves. Given even more time, that internal change begins to work its way out into the world. Eventually others will come into contact with the word made flesh, displayed through our lives, reflected in John's description of Jesus as "The Word (who) became flesh and blood and moved into the neighbourhood." (John1:14TMB) John, who in Revelation later declared, "Look. God has moved into the neighbourhood, making his home with men and women! They're his people, he's their God." (Revelation 21:3TMB)
As astounding as it may seem, God's dwelling place can look like us!

Sure – it's hard work making a house a home and settling into the neighbourhood of life. Thankfully we are not alone.

Paul puts it this way. "God is building a home. He's using us all – irrespective of how we got here – in what he is building. He used the apostles and prophets for the foundation. Now he's using you, fitting you in brick by brick, stone by stone, with Christ Jesus as the cornerstone that holds all the parts together. We see it taking shape day after day – a holy temple built by God, all of us built into it, a temple in which God is quite at home." (Ephesians 2:20-22 TMB)

All of this is an ongoing, creative work of the Holy Spirit, but even The Helper doesn't do it alone. Our willing buy in and cooperation is still required. As we choose to collaborate we become partners and co-creators with God who lovingly offers us an ongoing relationship. And, as God's workmanship, (*Philippians 2:12/13*) our ever patient Creator promises to stick with us and see us through to completion. (*Philippians 1:6*)

Sure – it's a risk inviting God in. But a worthwhile one. Be assured, our ever patient Creator likes what he sees. May we be reminded, the best dwelling place for God is within our hearts. Amen

I share Paul's words of encouragement to the Ephesians, as written in The Message Bible. He prays for them and us alike... "I ask him (God) to strengthen you by his Spirit – not a brute strength but a glorious inner strength – that Christ will live in you as you open the door and invite him in. And I ask him that with both feet planted firmly on love, you'll be able to take in with all Christians the extravagant dimensions of Christ's love. Reach out and experience the breadth! Test its length! Plumb the depths! Rise to the heights! Live full lives, in the fullness of God.

God can do anything, you know – far more than you could ever imagine or guess or request in your wildest dreams! He does it not by pushing us around but by working within us, his Spirit deeply and gently within us." (Ephesians 3:15-20 TMB)

Who, as a baby, was born and laid in a stable.

Who, in life, as a man ministered itinerantly

without a permanent place to rest his head.

Remind us to make space for others and room for you.

Dwell with and within us by your Spirit we pray.
