The Peace

Christ is risen!

Reading Acts 10:34-43

³⁴ Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵ but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶ You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. ³⁷ That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸ how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹ We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰ but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹ not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴² He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³ All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Reflection

The book of Acts is populated by a people who are trying to get their heads around what God is doing. It is plain by the end of the book that they are groping for understanding just as hard as they were when they were desperately attempting to work out what Jesus was talking about as he walked around Galilee. By the time Peter arrived at Cornelius' house you could be forgiven for thinking that perhaps he had got his act together and was starting to figure out what was going on. Yet it had taken a supernatural event for him to even make the journey to Joppa, breaking through his built in racism against foreigners. Even then you get a sense that he arrived expecting nothing much to happen given his obvious surprise at the Holy Spirit coming on Cornelius and his household. And while I am determinedly against racism I have a feeling that the surprise factor as Peter is faced with a radical challenge to his sensibilities is incredibly healthy.

Then there is the surprise the disciples expressed when Jesus rose from the dead. Peter speaks about it as if it were a foregone conclusion. By now he has had time to process the amazing events of Jesus' death and resurrection, but at the time they had no idea what was going on.

Here's what I think. I think that the sense of surprise we see all through the Gospels and Acts and even, in some places in the letters is an essential part of our faith. I think that when we cease to be surprised by what God is doing in us and through us and around us we begin to sink into a malaise that leads to hopelessness and death. I have a suspicion that many of the stories of failures in the Old Testament begin with people ceasing to be surprised by what God is doing.

Let's be real here. We know the Easter story, inside and out, backwards and forwards. The downside with that is that we are often no longer surprised by it. We no longer ask ourselves, 'How did that happen? What was God thinking? Why did it have to be that way?' So we begin to miss the excitement of the chase, of learning fresh ideas and being challenged to follow Christ in new ways. When we think we know it all we risk falling into the trap David fell into with Bathsheba, Elijah fell into after the prophets of Baal, Jonah fell into when he fled Joppa, Peter fell into when he had to be persuaded to visit Cornelius. It is a trap that leads to missing the best God has for us, that addicts us to comfort and sameness, that pushes out the sense of wonder that came with our first love in favour of stability and permanence.

This Easter I want to invite you to be amazed again by God. Be surprised. Be astounded. Be astonished. Not because you know the story so well, but as if you don't know the story at all and God is calling you to learn it again.

In Christ Alone – Video

Reading Matthew 28:1-10

After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. ² And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. ³ His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. ⁴ For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. ⁵ But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. ⁶ He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. ⁷ Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my message for you." ⁸ So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. ⁹ Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshiped him. ¹⁰ Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."

Reflection

Isn't it interesting to find the words fear mixed with great joy. I always find myself laughing at the angel saying to Mary and Mary, "Don't be afraid." What on earth else are they going to be besides afraid? A being whose appearance is like lightning and dressed in clothing white as snow rolling back a huge stone after and earthquake. I suspect I would be quite afraid as well.

So the women rushed off to tell the other disciples and they were filled with fear and great joy.

Those are both powerful emotions on their own. Putting them together would have been a potent mix. Now, I could reasonably stand to be accused of being cynical when I suggest that perhaps a degree of our Easter celebrations as Christians has as much to do with rote learning as it does with genuine wonder, let alone fear and great joy. We happily cry out, "Christ is risen," and respond with, "He is risen indeed." Yet how much of that is filled with the kind of gut churning fear and heart palpitating joy of the sort those two women experienced when they discovered he has indeed risen?

I know, I know, that particular moment has passed and will never be repeated and the question immediately arises, "How can we possibly experience that fear and joy?" Perhaps we can't in the same visceral manner, but that doesn't mean we can't set aside our reasoned knowing and be afraid of the

consequences, excited about those same consequences, stunned and amazed that this is all happening at once.

And so I make the invitation again. This Easter be amazed by God. Be surprised. Be astounded. Be afraid. Be astonished. Be excited. Be joyful. Not because you know the story so well, but as if you don't know the story at all and God is calling you to be in it again. To remember your first love and glory in it.

Christ is risen.

He is risen indeed!

God of surprises, of wisdom and grace we pause in your presence. Surprise again this day, we pray. Grasp us by our expectations and comfortable presumptions and squeeze us until we experience anew the fear and joy and astonishment that Jesus' disciples experienced that first Easter.
