Reading Acts 17:22-30

²² Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. ²³ For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. ²⁴ The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, ²⁵ nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. ²⁶ From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, ²⁷ so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. ²⁸ For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.'

Reflection

Most of you will be familiar with the KISS principle. Standing for Keep it Simple, with any S word you care to append, the idea is that the best solution to most problems is usually simple. It's not always the case, but it's a good rule of thumb. What KISS doesn't account for how we get to SIMPLE. It can often be deeply complicated and require a profound understanding of the mechanisms involved in getting to the solution. On a, dare I say simple level, an example of this could be the baking of a cake. The recipe might be for a cake of a certain size. Should I want to bake a cake twice the size I cannot merely double the recipe. The chemistry involved means that quantities have to be adjusted differently – perhaps more flour and less liquid, that sort of thing. The simple quickly becomes more complicated unless you understand the basic mechanics of cake baking. For those who are competent bakers it is very simple. For the reason we have recipes. You smart bakers don't need them.

How about an example from my house. I had to replace some rotten weatherboards before the painter came through and painted the house. Apart from some videos I had little idea what I was doing. The first couple of boards were a lesson in frustration and it took far more effort and a lot of mistakes and redos to get it done. As I went along, (and thanks to Derek who helped out and I think learnt as much as I did) I learnt some tricks and ways to do the job more easily. I don't think I ever got very good at it, but I was much better at the end than at the beginning. And with the experience and some thought given to the process it was much simpler by the time I got to the end than it had been in the beginning.

There's a saying among video gamers that goes, 'Get good, bro.' It is frequently repeated when a new player complains that a game is too difficult. It just means that if you want to do better, you have to work at it, practice, learn the craft – in other words, get good.

You have likely already worked out where I am going with this. Our Christian faith is like any other practice. We long for it to be simple. We look at men and women we respect both in the present and in history and we marvel at how they seem to practice a simple faith. It can all seem so easy, even in the midst of adversity, and we long to have a faith like theirs. Being human we look for easy ways of getting there. We search for recipes, and there are lots out there. You just need to read your Bible and pray every day. You should go on silent retreats. Find your thin place. Pray with others. Attend church every week. Attend homegroups. Make sure you keep up your giving. Donate to charities. Go on overseas mission trips. Be filled with the Holy Spirit. Speak in tongues. Be baptised. The list of recipes is endless. Some people try them all and simply give up. Others look at all of them and give up before even trying them.

The problem is that people find a recipe that works for them, mostly in hindsight, I might add, and then suggest that all you need to do to 'get good' is follow the recipe. But the recipe was for them. It was particular to their experiences and circumstances. It worked for them because it was them working it. Then someone else comes along and, hoping to Keep It Simple, they try to follow the recipe. Sometimes it works, perhaps often enough for someone to write a book about it. It becomes a meme and everyone wants in on the latest and greatest way to 'get good' with God. All of which misses the point.

Every one here is different. Our life experiences are different. Our hopes and dreams are different. Our resources are different. Our recipes are different. If we want to 'get good' we need to find our own path and to do that we need to

work at it. Not to be like that person on TV or in the books on our shelves. To be the person God has created us to be. To do that we need to go deeper. We need to burrow into God and build and deepen our relationship with God.

I have a feeling this was the key problem the Athenians faced. Over the years they had built up a series of recipes of how they might communicate with God. But it had become an intellectual exercise instead of a personal relationship. They knew ABOUT God. They even had an altar for God. But they didn't KNOW God. As Paul acknowledges, they were searching for God, groping toward God, sometimes even finding God. By focussing on the recipe they had lost sight of the need to go deeper, to become a friend of God. And God wants more from all of us. More than simply following a recipe of going to church, praying, reading our Bibles, putting into the offering plate. God wants our hearts and that means going deeper. Deeper into relationship. Then, in relationship we begin to find that all the complexity begins to dissipate and the SIMPLE becomes obvious.

In Christ alone

¹⁵ "If you love me, you will keep my commandments. ¹⁶ And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. ¹⁷ This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.

¹⁸ "I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. ¹⁹ In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. ²⁰ On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. ²¹ They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them."

Reflection

So, how do we go deeper without relying on someone else's recipes? I want to emphasise at this point that I am not trying to tell anyone how to do things. I want to suggest some things you might gather together to create your own recipe. I realise that it can be a frightening thing to have to step out on our own and make personal choices about how we are going to live. For some of us it is like a fish in water, easy and straightforward. For many it is more like a fish out of water. Small changes have us gasping and desperate to get back to the familiar. All of which means we move at different speeds. Some don't need to be told any of this. They've worked it out for themselves, years ago. For others, it makes no sense, no matter how often they go through it. That's OK. God has made us different – praise God for that! If you don't understand, or don't want to understand, or can't see that point, that's totally OK. Hopefully you'll get something out of this anyway. If you want to understand and just find it a struggle, that's OK too – talk with a friend about it, ask me, talk with God about it. In the end the deepest part of the creativity God has baked into us is built around relationship. So, let's begin there.

Jesus begins with the words, 'If you love me.' Here is the first hint to how we can begin building our personal recipes. Underlying everything we are is a love relationship between us and God. Perhaps we don't hold up our end of the relationship very well. That's not the point. The point is that God loves us and longs for us to love in return. Now, remembering this is not a recipe, God's love looks different for every single individual. It is always filled up to the brim, flowing over, but that brim looks one way for you and another for me. God's love accounts for those variations and contrasts. It is the same for you and me. We love different people differently, focusing on those aspects of their nature that are uniquely theirs. Idea one here is that going deeper with God is founded in love.

Next up, Jesus tells us to keep his commandments. Now having already covered love, what does that mean? If we look at Jesus' response to the man who wanted to receive eternal life we see something very interesting. Jesus mentions only six commandments: Don't murder, don't commit adultery, don't steal, don't lie, don't cheat, honour your father and mother." He then follows it up with selling what the man owns and giving the money to the poor. Let's think about this for a moment. There's no mention of what you or I might call 'Spiritual' stuff. I had not considered this before and here is what I think we can take away from it. First up, James tells us that faith without works is dead. Perhaps what we are seeing here is that our behaviour is representative of our spiritual condition. In other words, what you do reflects what you believe. So if you say that you love God but display no love for the people around you – worked out in not murdering, not stealing etc., then the chances are you probably don't love God. Does that sound familiar? So, idea two about going deeper with God is that how we treat other people matters. Which leads us to our next idea. Jesus asks the father to give us another Advocate, the Spirit of truth. My Cliff's Notes summary of this is that we can't

do it on our own. We need to have and acknowledge the person and work of the Holy Spirit in our lives if we are to go deeper with God. Now before you leap up with a yes, but, I am not defining how this might look. For some people this might look like what happened with Cornelius and his household when the Holy Spirit came on the people listening to Peter. Or like on the day of Pentecost, with visible effect and speaking in tongues. For others it might be a quiet, barely discernible shift in who and how they are. There is no, 'One size fits all,' going on here. The Holy Spirit knows you intimately and knows how best to form a relationship with you. I think it is possible for the Holy Spirit to be so subtle that it is only in looking back over years that you realise a change has take place. That said, it is likely that others will notice the change much sooner. Our third idea is that when the Advocate, the Spirit, becomes a part of our lives we are given an ability to go deeper with God that we didn't have beforehand.

It would be easy to go on, giving ever more complicated ideas, building recipes that become so complex that only experts can determine how to make them work. I'm pretty sure that's not how God wants it to be. I think that if we take the ingredients of love, relationship with others, and the presence of the Holy Spirit we can create our own, very personal recipe for going deeper with God. I think that when we go deeper with God, when we, 'get good,' things begin to happen in our lives that we never could have imagined before.

We Pray

Loving God, we know that we often only spend time with you on the surface. We don't go deeper because it seems too hard, too complicated, too much work. It's so much easier to float along, not making too much effort, never growing our relationship with you. And you keep on loving us, reaching for us, longing for us to go deeper with you. Help us to step into the deep with you, to find our own recipes for building a relationship with you that is wide as the ocean, high as the heavens and deep as the deepest sea. Through Jesus, who sent us the Advocate, we pray. Amen.
