Reading Genesis 32:22-31

²² The same night he got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. ²³ He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. ²⁴ Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. ²⁵ When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. ²⁶ Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." ²⁷ So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." ²⁸ Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed." ²⁹ Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. ³⁰ So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved." ³¹ The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

Reflection

You might remember a few weeks back I talked about how I don't like playing games where I have no chance of winning. What I didn't mention then is that if I end up playing a game like that anyway I will try with everything that is in me to win. I will watch my opponent closely for clues on how to play, I will work up strategies, and I will go to war with the only purpose being to win this game that cannot be won. Truth is, I can relate to Jacob. I'm reasonably sure that Jacob knew from the outset that he had no chance of winning this encounter. But that didn't stop him from trying with all his might. And even when his hip was dislocated in the effort he didn't give up and he didn't let go.

Now I have never had the misfortune to dislocate my hip, but from what I can gather it is incredibly painful. We are talking about some of the strongest muscles in the body pulling in the wrong direction against one of the largest nerves in the body. I suspect that there are very few people in the world with the ability to work through that sort of pain and hold on. But that is what Jacob did. Not only that, he refused to let go until he had been blessed.

I want to spend some time digging into this, but first we are going to get a small definition sorted. There is a difference between disciplined determination and stubbornness. When someone engages discipline and determination there is a considered process in action. That process may have been directed by circumstances, as in Jacob's case here, or it may have been carefully planned and formulated. There is a clear goal in place and a way to achieve that goal. The goal is important – it is always to improve, to move forward, to get better in some way. I am determined to grow and develop and I will do what it takes to achieve that goal.

Stubbornness, on the other hand, has a different goal. The goal of stubbornness is to hold on to what is past. I am not going to move because this is where I have always been and where I intend to finish. We often see it in children and we might chide them for being stubborn in holding on to something they cherish when it is long past its use-by date. We frequently see it in older people who insist on staying in their home far past the time when they can manage safely. It is my home and this is where I plan on dying, even if it puts others at risk and causes worry and grief to those who love me.

The truth is that there are frequently times when it can be difficult to discern the difference between the two approaches. I might be splitting straws here, and you are most welcome to challenge me. I think Jacob was showing discipline and determination in his encounter with the man by the ford of Jabbok. He had understood that this had the potential to be life changing and he was prepared to do whatever it took to come away with the very best he could manage. He understood that it was going to be incredibly difficult to achieve the outcome he desired. He understood that he would have to invest every bit of his strength and ability if he was to prevail. This situation was not a time for half-measures and easy choices. He was going to have to put absolutely everything into what came next. So that is what he did. He wrestled with the man until daybreak. And when the man saw that he could not win he put Jacob's hip out of joint. And still Jacob would not let go.

I have a suspicion that our lives are too easy. I suspect that many of us have forgotten how to prevail, if we ever learnt. I know that is a terrible generalisation and that some who are listening to me are having to invest every bit of your strength and ability to be here, listening today. (I will forgo the obvious joke at this point). If you are fully invested, then listen for those you know and love. It is difficult for me to look you all directly in the eye at this point, so please imagine that is what I am doing. I ask you the question: Will you invest every bit of your strength and ability to prevail? Let me be more specific. Will you invest every bit of your strength and ability to prevail for the people you love, and for the people you don't love – the Other?

Jacob knew that the blessing he asked for would be about more than just him. He knew it would encompass vastly more than he could even imagine. He was willing to endure wrestling until daybreak and then suffer the pain of a dislocated hip to receive that blessing. All so he could be blessed and through that to become a blessing to others. Jacob prevailed through discipline and determination. He prevailed because he saw beyond himself to a future that stretched beyond anything he could conceive.

So, I ask again, for you, for your church community, will you put everything you have, no matter how puny or insignificant it may feel, will you put all of it into prevailing with God?

Reading Matthew 14:13-21

¹³ Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴ When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. ¹⁵ When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." ¹⁶ Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." ¹⁷ They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." ¹⁸ And he said, "Bring them here to me." ¹⁹ Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he

looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. ²⁰ And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. ²¹ And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Reflection

I'm quite sure the disciples spent a large portion of their time as a foil demonstrating how not to do things. It's almost as if they are set up to fail at every step simply so Jesus could make a point. In some ways they are the very opposite of Jacob because they seem to give up whenever the opportunity presents itself. Sick person, we can't do that. Argument with the Pharisees, hang on while we call Jesus. Hungry people, no money and nowhere to spend it. What do you want from us Jesus? We're just ordinary people and you keep expecting the extraordinary. Does that sound at all familiar to you? I'm ordinary. Nothing special. I have no particular talents or skills to make me stand out in the crowd. I'm old, I'm slow, I get tired. I've nothing to offer. Tell them all to sort themselves out so I can sit down and rest.

And Jesus said to them, 'They do not need to go away; you give them something to eat.' How invested are you in this little project of ours? How hard will you fight to receive the blessing on offer here? I'm not asking you to do what you can't do. I'm asking you to do what you can do then trust me for the rest. Can you do that?' Hear that again. 'I'm asking you do what you can do then trust me for the rest.' Can you talk to a neighbour? Do that, then trust me for the rest. Can you bake a cake to give away? Do that and trust me for the rest. Can you give a word of encouragement to someone who is struggling? Do that, then trust me for the rest.

I attended a meeting the other day where a young man was sharing how he was working to encourage and send out young people into the harvest. We won't go into his basic premise, but I asked him how older people could get involved – the ones in their 70s and 80s and 90s. He stammered for a moment and ended up saying, 'Well they could pray, and they could give financially.' It made me quite angry because I look around at all the people who are of that age and I know very well they have more to offer than prayer and finance. When I think of the encouraging words so many of you have spoken to me. When I look at the crafts made, and the food cooked, and the groups organised and attended I see so much more than prayer and finance. I see a

community engaged in acts of faith. When an Other comes along we don't need to send them away to fend for themselves. We have the resources among us to give them what they need.

'But we have so little,' I hear someone mutter. Think about five buns and two fish among 5000. Jesus only needs your little, my little, to achieve special things. This is the other part of prevailing. In God's economy we don't have to bring the entire kit. We simply have to bring what we have. There is no way the disciples could feed 5000 people. They didn't have the cash and there was nowhere they could spend it if they did. It would be a bit like turning up in the middle of Fiordland with 5000 people, doing a whip around to get some cash together and then looking for somewhere to spend it. Not going to happen! In the same way, Jacob was never going to win his wrestling match with God. The point is that it wasn't about him winning. It wasn't about the disciples having the resources. It was about them investing what they had.

God knows very well that we don't have the resources to prevail in the situation we find ourselves. He knows our weaknesses. He looks us up and down and says, 'Bring me what you have.' Then he blesses what we have. Then we move on and share what has been blessed.

In the end prevailing is not about what we don't have. It is about how we use what we do have. If we bring disciplined determination together with a desire to receive God's blessing then God will surprise us with a blessing. Jacob received a blessing that flowed on to his family and from there through the generations to us now. The disciples received a blessing that flowed out to feed thousands of people. What blessing might we receive if we bring what we have?

We are created to be creators. It is not an idle expectation that we might somehow pop out something new or different. The deepest part of our creating comes when we offer all we have to God, determined to receive a blessing. When that happens, when we prevail with God, something changes in the world around us. People are fed, physically and spiritually and the kingdom of God draws nearer.

How do you need to prevail today?

We know how often we look at the little we have to offer and think it is too small to be of any use. We know the times we have walked away rather than push through difficulties we see ahead of us. Forgive us for our failing to trust you with the little we have to offer. Teach us to prevail with you, to push past the fear and to hold on until you bless us.
